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Chairman's Notes

The Sky Ride on July 25th was not universally welcomed, as it involved closing a 5-mile route in Bath, including the Royal Crescent, and clearing those streets of cars for much of the day to enable cyclists of all ages and experience levels to cover the route safely. Organisation of the event had been rushed because of the short notice the Council had of the event, and little thought had been given to alternative parking for the hundreds of displaced cars. Further, advance warning had not been distributed as efficiently as it should have been. If that or anything similar is to become an annual fixture like the Bath Half-Marathon, which fortunately has had little or no direct impact on the Crescent, the Society will insist on proper arrangements for alternative parking.

However there were positive aspects. We had a rare opportunity to see the Crescent as John Wood intended, without the encroachment of the motor car; the view of The Circus was similarly improved. Perhaps it will serve as an incentive to work towards the dream of an underground car park beneath the Lawn! It is estimated that around 6,000 took part on the day, and if the Sky Ride is at all successful in its aim of promoting cycling as an alternative to car use, that will help to reduce congestion and pollution in Bath. Even the most fervent anticyclist motorist must wish, when stuck in a traffic jam, that a dozen of the drivers in front of him had got on their bikes.

The gull problem in Bath continues to worsen, but efforts to persuade the Council to resume basement collections of refuse as a partial solution continue to fall on stony ground. The forthcoming waste food recycling due to start on October 4th after the distribution in September to all households of separate bins for all waste food should help to make the bags less appealing to gulls, but meanwhile we remain obliged to throw a party for them every Wednesday evening and Thursday morning.

It has been suggested that residents should combine to find a private contractor to lift rubbish up to street level shortly before the council collection is made. If you might be interested in participating in such a scheme, or have any ideas how it would best be implemented, please let one of the Society's Committee know; if there is sufficient interest, the Society will look at the practicalities.

The Society remains in need of an Editor and, as the reduction in size of this issue bears witness, contributions of copy of any form or type (within reason). The doubling up of Editor and almost sole author is not sustainable for the continuance of the Newsletter in its present form.

Dr David Sandilands

As briefly reported in the last issue Dr David Sandilands, of Birmingham and 17 Royal Crescent, died in February.

Born in Birmingham in 1930 as the son of two doctors, he was evacuated during the war to family in Maybole, Ayrshire, while his father was serving in France and Africa. During this time he won a scholarship to Epsom College, from where he won another scholarship to Corpus Christie College, Cambridge to study medicine. After further study at St Thomas' Hospital in London, he qualified in 1953, and completed his National Service in the RAMC with the rank of Captain. He joined his father Ian in general practice in 1959, by which time he had married his first wife Anne. He became senior partner in the practice on the death of his father in 1969. During his time as a GP, he also worked at Sorento Maternity Hospital and as a police surgeon for West Midlands Constabulary. After retiring in 1991 he continued with consultancy work for West Midland Fire Service and the Birmingham Taxi Service.

His many interests outside medicine included music, gardening and sport. He sang in the Birmingham Cathedral Choir and, contrastingly, loved swing and jazz. Having played tennis, cricket and rugby at school, he played serious tennis at Cambridge, and also became Medical Officer to Warwickshire Co. Cricket Club in the 1970's

He leaves a sister Diana, wife Madeline, who he married in 1978, son Jonathan, daughters Penny and Sue in the USA, and stepson Jonathan Sapey. They miss him sadly, as do his fellow occupants of no. 17.
